

To His Excellency The Honorable Lieutenant General [Alexander] Leslie Commanding His Majesty's Troops in the Southern District of N. America &ca. &ca.

Robert Ross Deputy Commissary General of Prisoners and lately returned from the Havana in the flag of Truce [ship] four Sisters, begs leave to represent

That Captain James Campbell of His Majesty's 42^d Regiment of foot, late Major of Brigade to Major General [John] Campbell [of Strachur] in West Florida, being Prisoner of war at the Havana, was about the 10th day of January last, at two hours notice, ordered to embark on board of a vessel bound to Mobile, where by order of General [Bernardo de] Galvez he is confined close prisoner in the fort, to remain in that condition during the continuation of the present war

The reason assigned for this harsh proceeding is said to be, some expressions in letters wrote by Captain Campbell to General Galvez, which have been deemed disrespectful.

To every person acquainted with the unwholesome Climate of Mobile, and the distress of the Spanish Garrison for good water, the communication with the Rivulet from which the fort was usually Supplied being cut off by the Indians, the above order regarding Captain Campbell must appear as equivalent to a death warrant.

Yesterday Morning, at Seven o'Clock died, at his House in Downing-Street, Lieut.-Gen. Simon Frazer, Colonel of the 71st Regiment of Foot, and Member of Parliament for the County of Inverness. His Death is said to have happened by the Bursting of s Blood-Vessel, owing to his having taken too strong an Emetic the Night preceding.

It is reported that Major-Gen. Sterling, who has commanded the Royal Highlanders during the whole War in North America, will succeed Gen. Frazer, as Colonel of the 71st, which is a Highland Regiment of two Battalion.

General in the army on Nov. 20, 1782.

Bath, Feb. 13. Arrived here...Gen. Stirling...

Excerpt of Letter from Gen. Lord John Murray, Col., 42nd Regt., to his Daughter, Mrs. Mary Foxlowe, Regarding Her Marriage to Lt. William Foxlowe (later Murray), 18th or Royal Irish Regt.,

London, Feb. 15, 1782

I wrote you the 11th ins^t., enclosed to your husband. The Queen in her Drawing Room wished me joy, but desired to know if I approved of your marriage; to which I replied that I did very much, as you desired it, and that his character is very good, is in the army, now raising an Independent Company for His Majesty's Service, and was second son of a very respectable family in Derbyshire; that the Duke of Athole and Lord Mansfield approved, and were trustees to the settlement. She then said 'it was very good,' and other words which were low, and I could not hear.

The Duchess of Athole is at Dunkeld, and lies in there in May next. The Duke and Duchess of Gordon are expected very soon. All our friends here are well; they and many more wish you joy. I am, my dear child,

General Leslie, and which his Letter now Submitted to their Perusal contains upon the whole of the Information laid before them, the Board is Of Oppinion that as the Vessel Carrying the Flag of Truce, was by unexpected and unavoidable events prevented from fulfilling the Purpose for which it was Sent, but afterwards enter^d. a British Port, and there landed a part of its Cargo, that this Vessel could no longer be Considered as a Flag of Truce and Consequently that the Goods and Stores in General, which composed her cargo, whether Consisting of Clothing for His Majesty's Troops, and those of his Allies or of private Property, and which fell into the Hands of the Enemy, were a legal Capture - And that as these Goods and Stores were Landed at Portsmouth in Virginia, then in Possession of the King's Troops, by Permission of Lieut. General Leslie for the use of the Army there, no Imputation of Neglect, or Breach of Trust can fall upon Captⁿ. Gerlach, who went with and had the care of the Clothing intended for the Troops of Convention - nor on Mr. Hoakesly who apparently was fulfilling his trust as Commissary by executing the Orders of Lieu^t. General Leslie, for forwarding His Majesty's Service.

The command of the Second Troop of Horse Grenadier Guards was awarded to His Highness Prince Frederick effective Mar. 23, 1782. Gen. Murray also did not receive the Governorship of Duncannon Fort. The fort is located on the southeast coast of Ireland, about 108 miles from Dublin.

I wrote Annie about [his son Lt.] Henry [Graham, 42nd Regt.] a little while ago & then mentioned that a possibility might be fallen on to keep him in Europe a little longer as she was very anxious but I thought the opportunity of C [Capt. [Alexander] McKay of 69th Reg^t accompanys me. when you settle w^t M^r D Erskine you will end it yourself w^t Henrys pay from 25th Dec^r 1780 in Subsist at 3-6 p^r day as this will answer both yours I shall not write Annie but offer her my affect Love with my best wishes, for Marys happy hour & the Welfare of you and yours as I am with great truth the most faithful of your friends & Serv^t.

The House resolved itself into a Committee of supply, the Secretary at War moved for several sums for the service of the army, stating that since the death of Lieutenant-General [Simon] Fraser, the 71st regiment, consisting of two battalions, had been divided into two regiments, one battalion to each; that the Earl of Balcarras, a nobleman of high rank, and an officer of distinguished merit in his profession, had been appointed of one; but though he was to command this regiment, he was not to derive any new rank from his appointment; he was already a Lieutenant Colonel; and it was only as such he was to command the new regiment, which he had engaged to recruit on very moderate terms indeed, and consequently advantageous to the country.

I have the honor to acquaint you, that the King has been pleased to order that your Regiment shall continue on Service, as consisting of twelve Companies; and that for this purpose, all the private men of both Batt^{ns}. of the Late General Fraser's Regiment in N°. America, whether prisoners or otherwise, be appropriated to the 71st Regiment under your command: that the Add¹. Comps. at Newfoundland be considered as a part of the same, that the Add¹. Comps. which are in Great Britain, be attached to the second 71st Reg¹. and that the whole of this arrangement shall take place from the 25th instant inclusive.

I have signified H.M's P. to Sir Guy Carleton on the several matters above stated, as well as for the return of the Officers and Non. Commd. Officers of the second 71st.

Enclosed you will receive a distribution of the Commissioned Officers into the two Reg^{ts}. in the settlement whereof, the rule observed has been, that all officers whose Commissions specify to what Battalion they were appointed, should remain in that Battalion; and that the rest of the officers should be appointed alternately according to their present seniority in the Regiment. A like list is transmitted to Sir Guy Carleton, who is at the same time informed, that His Majesty will have no objection to his making changes which he may think proper in the allotment of the Officers, either for their own convenience, or for the good of H. M.'s Service.

The absent officers of your Regim^t. who are not on Parole should be ordered to repair to New York by the earliest opportunity, on which head you will be pleased to give your directions without delay.

Sir.

I have the honor to acquaint you that upon the Death of Lieut: Gen¹. [Simon] Fraser, H.M. thought fit to order that the two Batt^{ns}. of the 71st. should be formed into two distinct Reg^{ts}. that the first Battⁿ., to the command of which Colonel [Thomas] Stirling of the Royal Highlanders is appointed, should be named the 71st. Reg^t. & that the other Battⁿ. should be named the Second 71st. Regiment, of which the Earl of Balcarras is appointed Lieut: Col: Comm^t. [Commandant] on condition of filling it up by Recruits raised in the Highlands of Scotland.

H.M. has further been pleased to direct that all the Private Men of both Batt^{ns}. now in America, whether Prisoners or otherwise, be appointed to the 71st. that the Additional Companies at Newfoundland be considered as a part of the same Reg^t. that the Additional Companies in Britain be attached to the second 71st. and that the whole arrangement shall take place from 25th. instant inclusive.

The 71st. Regt. is to continue on Service as consisting of the 12 Comp^s., & the Comm^d. [Commissioned] and non Comm^d. Officers of the second 71st. are to be sent home by the earliest opportunity.

Enclosed you will receive a Distribution of the Officers in the two Regiments; in the settlement whereof, the rule observed has been, that all officers whose commissions specify to what Battalion they were appointed should remain in that Battⁿ. and that the rest of the Officers should be appointed alternately according to their present Seniority in the Regiment. I am at the same time to acquaint you that H.M. will have no objection to any changes that you may think proper to make in the allottment of the Officers, either for their own Convenience, or the good of the Service under Y. C^d...

Mr [James] Robertson [Younger of Lude] went with them yesterday the length of Dunkeld and to proceed with a short call upon all their friends as they happen to be in the way but his Horses being so Old their baggage so heavy judged he hires a Chaise from Perth and thinks of going as far as Airdoch with them, lets them take the Chaise on to Stirling and it returns to Orchell and takes Mr. Ron: back till he meet his own carriage again You will not doubt of the struggle I had to pairt with two beloved dutyful and indeed promissing Sons at such a distence, and myself in so tender a way. but to day I am more composed then for severals past – Last night I mean the very night before they went letters came from my dear eldest Son of recommendations for Robert to Sir Eer [Eyre] Coot and General [William] Meddowes in case he go to India which I find every body wishes, and nothing I suppose will prevent it but the struggle are easily perceived it would be for the Brothers to pairt John wishes to go to India with Bob, and Bob to America with John ...

THAT our readers may be enabled to form an estimate of the value of our late acquisition in the East Indies, we lay before them the following account of Ceylon...

The following description of Trincomale, and account of its capture last war, are extracted from Munro's Narrative of the Military Operations in India during that period...

In 1782, two of the best sailing ships of [Adm.] Sir Edward Hughes's fleet were dispatched from Madras with 200 men from the 42d and 78th regiments, commanded by Capt. Hay Macduel, of the former, to reinforce Trincomale. This detachment arrived safely at Ceylon, and upon Captain Macduel's taking upon him the command, he found the two Forts, but particularly the lower one, in so weak a defence, that the labour of some four months was requisite to render them in any degree tenable.

Soon after Captain Macduel had taken upon himself the command, he found himself besieged by the active [Baillie de] Suffrein [de St Tropez, Commander-on-Chief, French Fleet], who had secretly sailed from Caddalore to Battocolo, where he was joined, on the 24th of August, by two line of battle ships and a formidable body of troops, with which force he quickly laid siege to Trincomale. Capt. Macduel, thus attacked, made as good a stand as his defenceless situation would admit of, but was forced to capitulate on the 30th of the same month; by which event, the most convenient and essential harbour in India was lost to the British Crown.

On Thursday, Sept. 5. there was a meeting of several noblemen and Gentlemen at Edinburgh, to Consider of a plan for raising a volunteer corps of ten companies, to serve without pay, (until called out on actual service), on Lord Shelburne's plan. They are to be clothed in the highland dress, and called the CALEDONIAN BAND. The meeting agreed to associate immediately, and appointed the following officers, viz, the marquis of Graham, colonel; the earl of Buchan, Lieutenant-Colonel; Maj. Alexander Donaldson, late of the 42d regiment, Major... The officers names are to be transmitted to Lord Shelburne, for his Majesty's approbation, with a request of arms and accoutrements. Near 300 have already given in their names to serve in the corps.

News Summary of Court Martial of Capt. Hay Macdowall, 2nd Battalion, 42nd Regt., for Surrendering Fort Trincomale, Ceylon (now Sri Lanka), Nov. 11, 1782

The following copy of the proceedings of a court martial, held upon Capt. Hay Macdowall, of the 42d regiment, for the surrender of Trincomale and its dependencies, has been lately brought from India by the Suprize packet:

Captain Macdowall's crime and sentence.

Crime.- Captain Hay Macdowall, of His Majesty's 42d regiment, lately commanding in the fort of Trincomale and its dependencies, put under arrest by order of Major-General James Stewart, commanding his Majesty's forces on the coast of Coromandel, for surrendering the fort of Trincomale to the French, under Mons. Sussrein, upon the 30th of August last, without sufficient cause for so doing, or before any practicable breach was made in that fort.

Dated Head Quarters, Fort St. George, November 11, 1782.

(Signed) HENRY MALCOLM, Adj.-Gen.

Sentence:- The Court having materially and deliberately considered the evidence for and against the prisoner, together with what he has said in his defense, find, that although there was no practicable breach effected, he did not surrender the fort of Trincomale till his amminition was nearly expended, and with every prospect of relief at an end: That in so doing, he complied with the orders he received from his Excellency the Commander in Chief, to defend the place to the last extremity: That the terms he obtained were equally honourable to himself and the garrison, and such as he had no reason to expect fro the situation he was reduced to, and the force opposed to him. The court is therefore of opinion, that the prisoner, Capt. Hay Macdowall, is not guilty of the crime laid to his charge, and do honourably acquit him.

My Lord

I have the honour to inform your Lordship of my Arrival here this Morning in His Majesty's Ship Portland from Newfoundland...

In Obedience to His Majesty's Order to Governor Edwards by Lord George Germain in a Letter dated the 16th of March 1781, I sent the remainder of the Detachment of the 42^d Regiment of Foot from Newfoundland to Halifax in the Thorn Sloop of War, to be conveyed from thence to New York in order to join the first Battalion of that Regiment, and directed Lieutenant Dougal Campbell who attended them thither to make the best of his way to England and join the Second Battalion to which he belongs.

I have only further to acquaint your Lordship that nothing particular has happened within the limits of my Government since the date of my Letter by His Majesty's Ship Winchelsea and that every thing remained quiet when I left S^t Johns the 31st of October.

I shall do myself the honor to wait upon your Lordship so soon as I receive permission from the Admiralty Board to come to Town and beg leave to subscribe myself



The following copy of the proceedings of a court martial, held upon Capt. Hay Macdowall, of the [2nd Battalion] 42d regiment, for the surrender of Trincomale [Ceylon/Sri Lanka] and its dependencies, has been lately brought from India by the Suprize packet:

Captain Macdowall's crime and sentence.

Crime.- Captain Hay Macdowall, of His Majesty's 42d regiment, lately commanding in the fort of Trincomale and its dependencies, put under arrest by order of Major-General James Stewart, commanding his Majesty's forces on the coast of Coromandel, for surrendering the fort of Trincomale to the French, under Mons. Sussrein, upon the 30th of August last, without sufficient cause for so doing, or before any practicable breach was made in that fort.

Dated Head Quarters, Fort St. George, November 11, 1782.

(Signed) HENRY MALCOLM, Adj.-Gen.

Sentence:- The Court having materially and deliberately considered the evidence for and against the prisoner, together with what he has said in his defense, find, that although there was no practicable breach effected, he did not surrender the fort of Trincomale till his ammunition was nearly expended, and with every prospect of relief at an end: That in so doing, he complied with the orders he received from his

Excellency the Commander in Chief, to defend the place to the last extremity: That the terms he obtained were equally honourable to himself and the garrison, and such as he had no reason to expect from the situation he was reduced to, and the force opposed to him. The court is therefore of opinion, that the prisoner, Capt. Hay Macdowall, is not guilty of the crime laid to his charge, and do honourably acquit him



(Former Lt. Col., 42nd Regt.), to William Graham of Airth, Regarding Officers of the 42nd Regt. and His Trip to Bareges, France, June 7, 1783

Bareges 7th june 1783

My Dear Airth,

I received your Letters of 31st March, & of 1st May...[Airth's son Lt.] Henrys [Graham] acct I shall give you at meeting, he got no money from me but £10 which I gave him as present at St Omer which wt the ballⁿ of the 470 Livres from Cap^t Stewart I think might make about 16 or £18 when he got to London he drew for £18.18 at Portsmth from the Agent & who paid £5.1.6 for hosiery for him, these two last articles are charged in his acc^t, his sea stock you wrote me cost him £16, so that he must have had enough with him, as there would probably be two months pay due him by the time he arrived at Halifax and he will receive a years arrears at Xmas which is about £15 Sterg, I am thus circumstantial to show you he ought not to be in straits, and I would not have him accustomed to expect any pecuniary assistance from you, 'tho I would by no means have the purse entirely shut against him if there was good reason for opening it, he has Magnified the price of sheeting, at least he ought to have said 8Sh Currency pr yard which is only 4.6 Sterling, he got 6 new Shirts at S^t Omers [France] if there has been no steps to him lately he is within the break, but last war the Lieut^s who chose it were permitted to serve on Ens^s pay, and I am clearly of opinion he ought to do so if he has it in his choice, & means to follow this profession, if he does not like it and wishes to take any other than he may go on half pay, this you should mention to [John Edmonstoune of Cambus Wallace for his son [Ens. William Edmonstoune, 42nd Regt.] to fix it as they may not have time given them to consult their friends, they ought therefore to be wrote to on that head that they may memorial the commander in chief in case of a reduction that they may be permitted to serve on Ensigns pay as the young Lt^s of the 42^d did at the end of the last war - I have had no Letter from him... I hope [Capt.] Hay Mcdowal [2nd Bn., 42nd Regt., Sri Lanka] will be able to prove he could do no more... what is [former Mai,] Archie [Erskine] about in getting daughters pray tell him to fill the Cambo better & mak a plook in place of a stimple

I arrived here the 21st of last month & never suffered so quick a change of Climate we had been sitting at Toulouse [southern France] w^t all our windows open and the weather too warm to go out in middle of the day, when I arrived here all the hills were covered with snow and on the 24th there was 8 inches on the streets as I was going to the bath & often has it fallen since & only w^tin these 3 days has the weather been tolerable I was the first that came & now there not half a dozen strangers

I am injecting, bathing, douching & drinking, at no allowance but my Eyes are beginning to be affected again & I am afraid I must suspend my remedys for some time, I was an hour today lying on my face while a Surgeon was probing & tugging at a splinter w^t his forceps but it is D--- obstinate it would not move I might have been making better use of that position in a hundreth part of the time w^t the Widow you recommend if she had been here but not being here with one of the Pyranean Nymphs who are as like our High^d Lasses as can be only that they would not throw a pail of Milk in your face was you to put half a crown in their bosom, but this is all theory my Dear Airth, no practice, I am so stewed in the baths, sweated [torn] parboiled at the Douche that there is not a drop of sap in [torn] my flesh soft as butter, my skin loose & wrinkled, my hairs Gr[torn] well might my old Friend at N York say now if she saw me, O Stirling you are grown old & ugly – well thank God I am not immortal I shall get rid of this old battered clay soon – but enough of this - tell [his sister] M^{rs} [Mary] Campbell I got her Letter of 7th May & shall write her soon, it will be near 7 weeks before I can have an answer to any Letter, let her therefore continue writing me till I bid her stop, I may perhaps take a sudden resolution of leaving this as I have no confidence in the waters in that case London will be the first place that will bring me up; Adieu, My Dear Willie, kindest Love to Annie & the bairns, remember me affecte^{ly} to all my friends, & believe me ever to be.



New-York, July 30... Last Friday evening [July 25] died at Powles-Hook, Major John Smith, of the 42d, or Royal Highland Regiment, and on Sunday his remains were interred there with military honours. During a service of twenty-nine years, his conduct as an officer and a gentleman, was uniformly such as acquired him the greatest respect and esteem of that regiment in particular, and of numerous acquaintances, who now sincerely regret the loss of so valuable a friend.

before 5 o'clock in the morning [from the Hotel de Soubise at that watering-place]

My dear Daughter,

I thank God I am much better than when I came here, and hope soon, by His goodness, to be as well as ever The Count d'Airtois, the King of France's brother, was here for a few days, and did me the honour several times to speak to me in English, which many of the people of fashion here do The Prince and Princess de Ligne, the Earl of Shelburne, his Lady, and the Miss Vernons (her sisters, by her mother, Lady Gower) are all very civil and obliging. She asked very kindly for you when we were at Aix-la-Chapelle. You remember to have dined with her at the Duchess of Bedford's, at Woburne... I hope you and your husband will be here next summer. My kind compliments to him and affectionate service. You will remember, if you and he can, to see Lord and Lady Spencer at Buxton, and send them the best of your fruit. Let me know how he does. I pray God to bless you both.

I have received both your Letters which were very agreeable as they told me of your Welfare, Jamies, & the young folks at home & the happy recovery of M^{rs} Erskine & M^{rs} Stirling being better; the confusion in the India affairs or rather total change makes it impossible to get any recommendation for James at present after all is arranged if I can my efforts shall not be wanting – I have this day heard of [Airth's son, Half-pay Lt.] Henry [Graham] he was to have come in a Ship which is arrived here & in which his baggage is but by etourdorie [thoughtless blunder] or some other cause he lost his passage & they tell me was to go in the Vessel that carrys the 71st to Clyde you may therefore expect him soon if not already arrived; I am sorry he did not come here as I have been planning for him but which I could not finish w^tout knowing what his Major [Walter Home, 42nd Regt.] had done or proposed, or if he was in the 42^d, if [Capt.] Cha^s Grant will sell or Cap^t [William] Dickson [of Kilbucho] as I would be clear for purchasing him a Comp^y as it would only cost £950 besides his Lt^{cy}, to which I will readily contribute, he might be put under stoppage of £100 p^r Annum to pay the interest & sink by little the capital

there is another opportunity in my [71st] Reg^t of a Comp^y which will cost £800 but this gives only rank of £50 p^r aⁿ more of half pay than his Lt^{cy} – his prospect of getting any thing in the army but by purchase is very poor for several years & even in that way the price will rise & will cost more all this should be well considered, I know it is more than you can afford to advance for him unless some of his friends would join, whenever he arrives inquire of him if his Major has any scheme for him & what it is or if he thinks Cap^t Grant will sell or Dixon as that would be a great inducement to me to get him in to 42^d otherwise it is the worst Corps for preferment for a Subaltern in the army... 

Letter from Half-pay Capt. Lord William Murray, late 77^{th} (Atholl) Highland Regt. (Former, Lt., 42^{nd} Regt.), to Mr. George Stewart, Explaining his Conduct while Commanding the 73^{rd} (MacLeod's) Highland Regt. in India in Early 1784

Newton, Oct. 23, 1787.

Dear Sir,

Agreeable to your letter to [his Mother] the Dutchess [Strange], which arrived this morning, I send you the following little narrative. Though it is long, yet I could not well curtail it more than I have done without leaving out some material facts.

Early in the year 1784 I found myself [verbally] attacked by a party [of officers] in the 73rd, who, on account of my promotion, were determined to do me every injury in their power. I found it necessary to vanguish them by some means or other. I tried lenient, but so far from having the desired effect, it only cemented the confederacy against me. I then, from my own observation, and the advice of my best friends, found a different course must be pursued. I accordingly begun by calling on Captain [James] Robertson, who I had many reasons to consider a leader. He met me, and after exchanging a shot, gave me every satisfaction I could wish. This happened, I believe, in May; but previous to our meeting, Captⁿ [John] Hamilton informed me that by calling on Capt. Robertson I had made the whole corps my enemies, and that I should have to fight them from right to left. It was in my own tent, where a brace of loaded pistols were lying on the table. I told him, if he liked it, I would begin with him, and that it would be better to finish the business immediately. He declined my offer, saying he was not the first for duty, but that it should be settled by lot. I told him they would always find me prepared and ready to meet the officers of the corps either singly or collectively. All was quiet, and I heard no more of them till the end of August at Arcot; but I always used the precaution of going well armed to prevent a surprise. At that time news arrived from England that I was not confirmed in the Majority of the corps. The day of this being published in orders, I was engaged on a shooting party, and found at my return that Captain [James] Baird, to whom the command of the Regiment had devolved, had, during my absence, in a most unmilitary and ungentlemanlike manner, entered my house, taken out the colours of the corps and withdrawn the guard. Early next morning I made a complaint to Gen¹ Home [East India Company], who commanded the cantonment. He said he conceived him to blame, but that he being an officer in his Majesty's service, he could not interfere. That very night I set off for Madras, and next morning waited on Gen¹ Campbell with a formal complaint. His answer was, that as I was now [back] on half pay he knew nothing of me, but that if I found myself injured with Captⁿ Baird's behaviour, I probably did not want spirit to resent it. I knew what he meant, but for many reasons did not wish to have a personal settlement with Capt. Baird. The same night I left Madras for Pondicherry, where I arrived in two days, and took my passage on board a French ship for Lisbon; but a few days before she was to sail I received letters from some of my friends that Capt. Baird and others (conceiving I had left India), were aspersing my character in a most infamous manner. I immediately set out for Arcot, but on my arrival there found it necessary to go to Madras to settle some private business before I took further notice of any other circumstance. It was late in October before I returned to Arcot. I called out Captain Baird, who touched me slightly, and made an apology, which he was afterwards so infamous as to retract. We parted, and I found the next person who had insulted me greatly to be Mr. [Lt. Gilbert] Waugh, a person who I had countenanced and pushed forward in the corps, and who had ever enjoyed my friendship and outmost confidence. I thought that he had behaved so as not to deserve being treated like a gentleman. I horsewhiped him. The natural consequence was a challenge from him. We met [Oct. 31, 1784] and tossed up for the first fire; I gained, but told him I had received sufficient satisfaction, and desired him to fire. He did so, and only grazed my hair. I then fired [and critically wounded Waugh who soon died] – Such is the outline of this unlucky business, I was 14 or 15 months in arrest, and could not get a trial. Let me know as soon as possible what I am to look for from the Father, and when I am to settle with my agent. Comp^s to M^{rs} Stewart, and remain Your most obt humble Svt, Wm Murray.

My son was knocked down in the market-place by Lord William, without telling him what it was for' and in consequence of which the Major ... was fully determined to bring the business into a Court of Justice immediately, as he knew that Lord William was returned from India..." The author continued to explain that "The Duke and General Murray referred Lord William's case to some legal authorities, who gave an opinion that it had been decided in another case that a half-pay officer could not be tried by a court-martial for an act done when on half-pay. As nothing further is mentioned on the subject, it is probable that Lieutenant-Colonel Browne brought his influence to bear on Major Waugh, and that the matter was dropped."



Spanish town Jamaica 18th. Jan^{ry}: 1784

Dear Sir

Your favour of the 6th: of Sept^r: only reached me last Evening, and was the first of your letters received on the subject of Richmond Estate. –

By Cap^t: James Campbell of the 42^d: Reg^t. I am happy to have it in my power to forward the enclosed information regarding that property; part of which has been extracted from the records of the Secretary Office of this Island, and part collected from the best authorities I could procure: I wish they may prove satisfactory.

Cap^t: Campbell will inform you, of his release from the illiberal treatment of Don Bernardo de Galvez; being detained as a hostage to satisfy the caprice of that General, for upwards of two years and a half; contrary to the Capitulation of Pensacola. –

By this misfortune he was secluded from every military exertion; suffered much in rank, and greatly in his private fortune. — I am however in hopes that an officer who has discharged his duty for 22 years with Zeal and fidelity, will not pass unnoticed in the herd of Officers, aspiring to the Rank of Major. —

It gave me infinite satisfaction to learn from Admiral [James] Gambier, the most favourable intelligence of your health; That you may long Continue to enjoy that Blessing, is the ardent wish of Dear Sir

On my arrival here I found that the matter either had not been fully considered, or that it was not finally determined.

The following circumstance obliges me, as Commanding Officer of the 1st: Battⁿ: to be anxious to have the matter ascertained.

Cap^t: [Charles] Grant who purchased his company nine years ago, gave in his Resignation to retire from the Service on receiving the regulated price for his Commission, / just before my departure from Halifax; and I should wish to recommend the Senior Officers of each Rank in the first Battalion to succeed to the promotion, provided they will not be in danger of being put on half pay by the interference of the 2^d: Battⁿ: with the first. I hope Sir you will forgive me for representing the hardship to which the

first Battⁿ: will be exposed by this Interference. The second Batt was raised in Britain when the first was on Service in N^o: America without the smallest benefit or advantage by promotion to the old Officers of the first Battⁿ: the two Corps have constantly been employed on separate & distant Services without interfering; & if they should interfere at last, the old & established Battalion will have been placed thereby in a Situation where it would only lose, and where it was impossible to gain. The two Senior Cap^{ts}. of the first Battⁿ. at this moment, were Officers before the Major of the Second Battalion was born.

By a letter from Skye we have an account, that as Capt. Norman Macleod, late of the 71st regiment, was going, on Feb. 8. in a boat with his wife, whom he had lately married, and her sister, upon a visit to some friends; the boat struck upon a sunken rock when she filled and overset. The Captain got hold of an oar, where he remained with his wife and her sister near two hours, when they were all three taken up by a boat from the shore. Every effort was tried, but unfortunately in vain, to recover Mrs Macleod."

If I live, I shall endeavour to get you the rank of King's aide-de-camp. By that means you will be Colonel... I have written to the Duke of Athole that I wish he would speak to the Minister "about a title for you before you leave England, "and I have sent the letter to M^r. [Alexander] Anderson to deliver. Please acquaint your father of this, but no one else, not even your wife, for women are bad secretaries I have let the Duke of Gordon know that you intended making him a visit at Gordon Castle, but were called away [from Pitnacree] on business, and had not time even to see my sister at Banff Castle. If the Duke of Athole is not in town when you come there, take my letter to him (from M^r. Anderson) to the Duke of Gordon to open. He will then see what I have said to the Duke of Athole, and that I beg he will introduce you to the King, speaking first of it to the Minister, to have his approbation. I have written likewise to M^r. Anderson to advance the money for the fees.

My dear Madam, Pray excuse my silence, as I believe I made a promise of writing to your Ladyship as soon as I arrived at Berne, and am quite ashamed to have so long delayed that pleasure. ... We had a pleasant and good journey to Berne, and found my father in very good health and spirits, and very happy to see us Berne is a very pretty town, and very clean.

We staid some time in Berne, and are now at the Chateau de Gerensee, a very good modern house, which my father has taken for the summer and autumn. It is the property of a lady at Berne, and stands in a most charming, romantic situation. At the front we have prodigious mountains which overtop the clouds, and appear quite close to us, but are at several miles' distance. We have likewise a fine view of the mountains which surround the glaciers, and are covered with eternal snow; as well as of other mountains enveloped with thick woods. There is also a pretty lake, which belongs to the house, and in which we have the liberty of fishing.

With the hope of hearing soon of your welfare, and that your Ladyship and Lord Effingham have continued in perfect health since I had the happiness of seeing you at Peckham Rye, I am,

Certainly you went on your knees to thank God, who has preserved you, and you pray to be kept from passion and jealousy, your great faults. Be very obedient to your husband, and submissive in all things, which is ordained by God Almighty. It is your own fault if you are not happy. I am very old—seventy-six

years of age, and I will give you for pin-money £100 a year, and £50 for the rent of another house, provided you use your husband very well. Otherwise I shall order you nothing. Banner Cross is an old house, which I shall keep in my own hands for my life. You will soon come to it, as soon as I die, which cannot lie long. Consult with your husband about it, and tell me what you decide. I have written to Mr. Anderson of this. I hope you will both be happy.

Moncrieffe, by restoring him to his original Appointment. It is accordingly His Majesty's Pleasure that M^r. Moncrieffe be considered as Major of Brigade to the Forces under your Command, upon his Arrival in Nova Scotia (wither he will be ordered immediately to repair) or upon Captain Campbell's quitting that Province, which ever shall first happen. But in case Major Moncrieffe's again leaving America, his Appointment of Major of Brigade is to cease,

and, agreeably to the Rule laid down by my Predecessor's Letter of the 17th June 1783, the Employment is thereafter to be held only by Officers belonging to the Regiments on the Spot.

Letter from Mr. Thomas Fowlowe to his Father, Samuel Foxlowe, Esq., Regarding the Paris Death of Gen. Lord John Murray, Passy, France, May 27, 1787

My Lord John Murray, I observed in my last, had been often to see us lately. On Tuesday [May 22] last he came to take a family dinner, as he had done before, but was taken ill upon the road, and was with some difficulty got out of his coach. He was not, however, so ill but he insisted on walking up stairs, that is, he would not submit to be carried. He eat next to nothing (as I am told, for I was not there, being engaged upon business at Paris), but fancied himself better before he went home. The next morning I called upon him, and found him, as he said, perfectly recovered. In the afternoon of the same day I accidentally fell into company with the Duke of Gordon, to whom I gave my Lord John's address. He called to see my Lord, with whom he staid some time, and my Lord's valet has taken it into his head that the pleasure he received from his visit, and the exertions he made, caused some extraordinary revolution in his frame, in short, he became unwell immediately on his leaving him, and yesterday was so much worse that the man sent for Lord and Lady Findlater, who live very near. The man had before got a physician, and Lord Findlater also sent for his own, who at once pronounced that he could be of no use whatever, that nature appeared entirely exhausted, and that probably he could not survive many hours. As the physician foretold, he died at eight o'clock in the evening, I believe without a struggle. Lord Findlater was with him a very few minutes before he died, and Lady Findlater again a very little while after. My Lord Findlater did me the honour immediately to send me notice of the event, requesting 'that I would give the necessary orders for the funeral, and the disposal of his Lordship's effects.' I dined with them today, after seeing him early in the morning, when he referred everything to me, sensibly observing, however, that unnecessary expense should be avoided. On calling upon the Commissary who has the management of these affairs, I found that, even if it had been desired, there could have been no public funeral, on account of the difference of the religions. I took an acquaintance with me, a gentleman perfectly conversant with such concerns, that I might not be imposed upon, and settled the ceremony so as to meet with my Lord and Lady Findlater's perfect approbation. The funeral will be to-morrow night, the duty performed, I believe, by the Ambassador's Chaplain. You will have observed in the papers that the 'Droit d'aubaine' is taken off from all English subjects, consequently I suppose we shall have no trouble respecting the effects. They are at present under the seal of the Commissary, and I shall open them before my Lord Findlater and proper witnesses. I do not write by this post to my brother, as you will mention this matter to him and M^{rs}. Murray much better than I can by letter. My Lord and Lady Findlater have been extremely civil indeed to me, and have both given me pressing invitations to come to see them whenever I come to Paris, and to dine with them, etc. He has the character of an exceedingly dry, reserved man, very difficult of access. I found him, as I think, naturally of a serious turn, but of very amiable, polished manners. She seems a jolly, good-natured woman.

Lady Findlater says there is no probability of finding a will made on this side the water, as she thinks the poor old man had no idea of dying these ten or twenty years. I wish you would come over with my brother...

Commanding his Majesty's force in British America, bordering on the Atlantic Ocean, and Colonel of the 57th regiment, &c. &c.

"Impressed with a sense of the attentive regard, you have discovered to the interest and welfare of this community during your command, the inhabitants of Halifax are induced thus publickly to express their sentiments, of gratitude and esteem, upon the occasion of your departure..."

Deaths. 1787 June 4. AT Wallajabad, in the East Indies, justly and universally lamented the Hon. Col. George Mackenzie (brother-german to Lord Macleod), of his Majesty's 71st regiment and commandant of the second brigade. — His remains were conveyed to the garden house of William Balfour, esq. at Madras, escorted by a party of the 19th light dragoons, and a detachment of infantry. Every military honour was paid by the second brigade on the removal of the corpse from Wallajabad. On the evening of the 7th, his body was deposited in the church-yard of Madras [now Chennai]. During the funeral ceremony, half-minute guns were fired from the fort, the flag hoisted half-mast high, and three vollies were fired from his Majesty's 14th regiment of Hanoverians over the grave. The Governor, Council, and Settlement, civil and military, attended to pay the last tribute to the remains of a gallant soldier and warm friend."

Account of Duel Involving Capt. George Dalrymple, 42nd Lt. Infantry Company, by Lt. William Dyott, 4th (or King's own) Regt., Halifax, Aug. 20, 1787

Aug. 20. – A duel was fought between Captain Dalrymple of the 42nd and Lieutenant [Charles] Roberts of the 57th, owing to the former having two years prior to the duel said in a company that Mr. Roberts was not fit for the Grenadiers; at the same time hinting that he had sold some of his brother's books. Lieutenant Roberts at the time this discourse took place was in Europe, and not meeting with Captain Dalrymple till now, he being quartered at Cape Breton, had not an opportunity of demanding satisfaction.

They fired only one pistol each, as Captain Dalrymple was wounded in the right arm, but not dangerously.

Letter from Half-pay Capt. Lord William Murray, 77th or Atholl Highland Regt. (Former, Lt., 42nd Regt.), to Mr. George Stewart, Describing Details of His Command of the 73rd Highland Regt. in India, Newton, Oct. 23, 1787

Dear Sir. Newton, Oct. 23, 1787.

Agreeable to your letter to [his Mother] the Dutchess [Strange], which arrived this morning, I send you the following little narrative. Though it is long, yet I could not well curtail it more than I have without leaving out some material facts.

Early in the year 1784 I found myself attacked by a party in the 73rd, who, on account of my promotion, were determined to do me every injury in their power. I found it necessary to vanquish them by some means or other. I tried lenient, but so far from having the desired effect, it only cemented the confederacy against me. I then, from my own observation, and the advice of my best friends, found a different course must be pursued. I accordingly begun by calling on Captain [James] Robertson, who I had many reasons to consider a leader. He met me, and after exchanging a shot, gave me every satisfaction I could wish. This happened, I believe, in May; but previous to our meeting, Captⁿ [John] Hamilton informed me that by calling on Capt. Robertson I had made the whole corps my enemies, and that I should have to fight them from right to left. It was in my own tent, where a brace of loaded pistols were lying on the table. I told him, if he liked it, I would begin with him, and that it would be better to finish the business immediately. He declined my offer, saying he was not the first for duty, but that it should be settled by lot. I told him they would always find me prepared and ready to meet the officers of the corps either singly or collectively. All was quiet, and I heard no more of them till the end of August at Arcot; but I always used the precaution of going well armed to prevent a surprise. At that time news arrived from England that I was not confirmed in the Majority of the corps. The day of this being published in orders, I was engaged on a shooting party, and found at my return that Captain Baird, to whom the command of the Regiment had devolved, had, during my absence, in a most unmilitary and ungentlemanlike manner, entered my house, taken out the colours of the corps and withdrawn the guard. Early next morning I made a complaint to Gen¹ Home [East India Company], who commanded the cantonment. He said he conceived him to blame, but that he being an officer in his Majesty's service, he could not interfere. That very night I set off for Madras, and next morning waited on Gen¹ Campbell with

a formal complaint. His answer was, that as I was now on half pay he knew nothing of me, but that if I found myself injured with Captⁿ Baird's behaviour, I probably did not want spirit to resent it. I knew what he meant, but for many reasons did not wish to have a personal settlement with Capt. Baird. The same night I left Madras for Pondicherry, where I arrived in two days, and took my passage on board a French ship for Lisbon; but a few days before she was to sail I received letters from some of my friends that Capt. Baird and others (conceiving I had left India), were aspersing my character in a most infamous manner. I immediately set out for Arcot, but on my arrival there found it necessary to go to Madras to settle some private business before I took further notice of any other circumstance. It was late in October before I returned to Arcot. I called out Captain Baird, who touched me slightly, and made an apology, which he was afterwards so infamous as to retract. We parted, and I found the next person who had insulted me greatly to be Mr. [Lt. Gilbert] Waugh, a person who I had countenanced and pushed forward in the corps, and who had ever enjoyed my friendship and outmost confidence. I thought that he had behaved so as not to deserve being treated like a gentleman. I horsewhipped him. The natural consequence was a challenge from him. We met and tossed up for the first fire; I gained, but told him I had received sufficient satisfaction, and desired him to fire. He did so, and only grazed my hair. I then fired – Such is the outline of this unlucky business. I was 14 or 15 months in arrest, and could not get a trial. Let me know as soon as possible what I am to look for from the Father, and when I am to settle with my agent. Comp^s to M^{rs} Stewart, and remain

Extract of Letter from Gen. Charles, Earl Cornwallis to Hon. Henry Dundas Regarding Performance of Maj. Hay Macdowal and the 73rd Regt. (Formerly, 2nd Battalion, 42nd Regt.), Munger, India, Nov. 16, 1787

Dear Sir, Near Mongheer, Nov. 16, 1787.

I have been most agreeably surprised at the good condition of the native troops. A spirit of exertion and emulation prevailed throughout the whole, and I have no doubt that they will soon arrive at a very high pitch of discipline. The 73rd regiment is in excellent order, and does great credit to the pains which Colonel [Norman] Macleod [of MacLeod] and Major Macdowal have taken with it, but what shall I say of the Company's Europeans? I did not think Britain could have furnished such a set of wretched objects. I would infinitely rather take the 73rd regiment upon service with me, than the whole six Company's battalions. Indeed, I have great doubts whether by drafting the whole six, I could complete one serviceable battalion to the present establishment...

Account of Dinner of Lt. Col. Charles Graham, 42nd Regt., with Capt. Prince William Henry (later King William IV), *HMS Andromeda*, by Lt. William Dyott, 4th (or King's Own) Regt., Sydney, Cape Breton, Canada, Sept. 24-25, 1788

Wednesday [Sept. 24] – About three o'clock we came to an anchor in Spanish River (Cape Breton), having had a remarkably fine run from Shelburn. Immediately on our coming to anchor, the Prince sent for us to dinner. The entrance into the harbour has nothing very striking...The next morning [Sept. 25] we weighed and went about nine miles up the harbour, and anchored off the new settlement called Sydney. The harbour from the mines is about three miles broad, and the shores entirely covered with wood to the water's edge. The French, I believe, had a small settlement here at the time Louisburg was taken in '57, since when it has been quite deserted till the year '83, at which period a governor, etc., was sent out from England, a man of the name of [Joseph Frederick Wallet] Des Barres, a captain in the 60th regiment; a great surveyor, having published a survey of the coast of North America from Florida, but a most eccentric genius. He fixed the seat of government at Sydney, and I am sorry to say that their improvements have not a very propitious appearance at present. He dined with his Royal Highness; Lieut.-Colonel Graham, who commands a part of the 42nd regiment quartered at Sydney, dined on board. We got pretty hearty, and went on shore in the evening and supped at Colonel Graham's. The town of Sydney consists of about fifty houses situated on the banks of Spanish River, and surrounded to the very sides of the buildings by an almost impenetrable wood. There is a narrow path from the barracks just to keep up a communication, and that's all the clear country I saw. The barracks are shamefully bad; the troops have cleared a good parade and made themselves as comfortable as their situation would allow. The officers had no rooms in the barracks, and were obliged to build huts and log-houses.

On the 13th, the Prince reviewed the eight companies of the 42d or Royal Highland regiment in garrison there, and commanded by Lieutenant Colonel Graham. His Royal Highness was pleased to express much approbation of their readiness and handsome appearance, and honoured the officers of the regiment with his Company to dinner, where many loyal toasts were drank and the festivity concluded with a *Feu de Joye*.

Diary Account of Lt. Hugh Fraser, 42nd Regt., and Family by Phillip Barrington Ainslie, Edinburgh Castle, 1791

1791. The gallant 42nd regiment (the Royal Highlanders) were quartered in the Castle of Edinburgh during the early part of this year. Many of the officers being of my father's acquaintance (having met them on service during the Seven Years' war), he often received them at his house...

Many of the officers of the 42nd were of the clan Fraser, amongst whom was Captain Fraser who commanded the grenadier company. He had served from early youth in the gallant "Forty Twa," and under the lamented Wolfe, led the grenadiers when they stormed the heights of Abraham. In all the actions where the Royal Highlanders were engaged during the Seven Years' war, he was distinguished for his gallantry. Two sons of his held commissions in the 42nd—the youngest, Simon, was considered the handsomest man in the regiment.

The other members of the gallant veteran's family consisted of his wife, a most amiable matron, and an only daughter, the sweet and bonnie Sally. The motherly kindness of Mrs. Fraser to my companion Benjy Bartlet and myself, when we visited her and bonnie Sally, in the castle, I still remember with much gratitude. Their apartments were in the Great Square, where, in the olden time, the palace was situate, in one of the apartments of which the unfortunate Queen Mary was born. Mrs. Fraser, while administering with true Highland hospitality to our creature comforts, delighted and interested our young imaginations with many a traditionary historic anecdote of the wrongs and sorrows, and melancholy fate, of the beautiful but erring Mary Stuart, narrated with a fervour and warmth in which we heartily participated. Captain Fraser was in manners and appearance the perfect Highland gentleman, and gallant soldier; yet, although he had served so long, was at this time no higher in rank than the eldest captain of his regiment...



Journal Account of Capt. Lt. James Stirling, 42nd Regt., by Phillip Barrington Ainslie, Musselburgh, 1793

1793...Also at this time, the gallant 42nd Highlanders (waiting for transports) were quartered in Musselburgh ... The light company was commanded by Captain Stirling, an intimate friend of my father's. He was very kind to me, and, by the present of a green light infantry feather, which he stuck in my cap, nearly enlisted me "to follow the drum;" but, as my decided predilection was for the navy, "the scarlet fever" was soon cured.

Captain Stirling (who got his commission in the 42nd when very young) served through the American war, and afterwards with the Duke of York in Flanders; with Sir Ralph Abercromby, in Egypt; and also throughout the Peninsular war. He was ever distinguished for his indomitable bravery and coolness in action. In the battle of Alexandria, he commanded the 42nd, when Buonaparte's Invincibles were nearly annihilated, and their eagle taken by the gallant Highlanders. After the Peninsular war, he attained the rank of major-general, and retired from active service, shattered in health, and with the scars of many wounds received in "hard-fought fields." A brother veteran, who had served with him during many years in the 42nd, related to me (after the General's death) several traits of his extraordinary coolness and gallant demeanour in action. At the battle of Corunna, where the 42nd were, as usual, in the thickest of the fray. General Stirling (then colonel in command of that regiment) walked about in front of his men under a continued and most severe fire, with as much coolness as on a mere parade. Some years after, I met and conversed with a colour-sergeant of the 42nd (who had been severely wounded at Corunna), respecting the position of the gallant Highlanders when the French advanced. His reply was most characteristic: "Weel, ver honour ye see, we were drawn up in line. Some o' us had faan, for the cannon-shot came thick; but no' a man but stood as firm and dour as Craig Alachy. The Cornel, honest man, just walked about in front o' us wi' a bit switch in his hand, as quietly as if he had been on the parade on the Castle Hill o' Embro'. Naething anger'd him till we cam' to the charge; and then he was ave foremost, and just like a wild boar."

I have to acknowledge the honour of your Ladyships letter of the 6th Ins^t: with your handsome donation to M^r. Young by a bill indorsed to me from the house of Forbes Hunter & C^o. for £50 on Mess^{rs} Moffat Kensington, Lyon London which I have this day remitted to Mr Young & who will I am sure receive this mark of your goodness with the greatest gratitude, and likewise your kind assurance of applying to M^r. Dundas for some small annuity or secure place to protect him from future want; I take the liberty of mentioning in case M^r Dundas should make any difficulty of procuring a pension or sinecum place, that an Ensigncy in the Invalids would answer equally well, & As M^r Young was a loyalist and served in the Army in America it gives him some pretension, it may be objected that he sold out of the Army, but it was want off health that forced him to that measure, as he could not possibly join his Reg^t & the Country was then likely to be involved in a war with Spain so that no delay could be procured. He got a compensation from the Commissioners for his losses in America but it was so small an amount that great part of it was spent hanging on in London before he received it, the residue with the sale of his commission he laid out in purchasing some Officers half pay to make up an annuity but upon a decision of Lord Kenyons that they could not sell it, one or two of them very dishonourably detained their certificates by which he was deprived of that resource - Mrs Ferguson is still alive but the last account he gave me of her was that she was disposing of her property very fast and probably she might soon have nothing left having got in to very bad hands.

As your Ladyships thinks I ought to apply I shall write to Gen¹ Murray to speak to M^r Dundas but I am satisfied your application will be sufficient only I beg to add that what can be done for him should not be delayed. He is a most unfortunate but deserving man, well informed, & an excellent heart otherwise I should not have troubled your Ladyships. M^{rs} Campbell joins me in most respectfull Comp to your Ladyships, we as all M^r Youngs friends must claim a just sense of humanity to him.

I am happy to learn you have heard from M^r Grame lately who I hope has benefited from his travels.



News Account of Actions of Lt. Col. John Ritchie, 3^{rd} Battalion, 60^{th} Regt. (Former Lt., 42^{nd} Grenadiers) at St. Vincents, West Indies, June 6, 1795

WEST INDIES. ST. VINCENT'S GAZETTE. JULY 11.

Immediately after the publication of the narrative of the 6th ultimo [June], our situation, which had continued upon the defensive since the recapture of Dorchester Hill on the 8th of May was very suddenly changed to the most active and successful offensive operations against the enemy [French and Caribs – runaway slaves]... On the 8th ultimo, a detachment of Major Malcom's corps of rangers, consisting of 100 men, arrived from that island [Martinique] and the 3d battalion of the 60th regiment (which under the command of Lieutenant-colonel Ritchie, sailed from England, destined for Demerary, [a Dutch colony on the north coast of South America, later British Guiana], but were not landed, in

consequence of the representations of the inhabitants, and had arrived at Barbadoes,) were also ordered here by the commander in chief, and came down on the 9th...

A little before day-light on the 11th, the enemy at the Vigie began to beat the *reveille*, about which time Lieutenant-colonel Ritchie's division began their attack on their upper post, from which they immediately fled. His division then posted on to the second height, which was also soon abandoned by the enemy. The enemy, at first only observing Lieutenant-colonel Ritchie's division, actually came out to attack him; but Lieutenant-colonel Leighton appearing at that instant, they precipitately returned...

About eight o'clock the enemy beat the *charade*, and sent a flag to demand terms, which were refused them, and a party of the 46th ordered to storm the place, which they did, followed by the whole...

WEST-INDIA NEWS. From the ST. VINCENT'S GAZETTE, of October 17 [1795]. KINGSTOWN, OCTOBER 17...

...The 21st and 22d the enemy made their appearance in Mirriaqua, about Dr. Young's, and the following day took a position between the Vigie and town of Fairbairn's ridge...

The communication between the Vigie and Kingstown being thus intercepted, Lieutenant-colonel Ritchie, with a party of about three hundred regulars and rangers, was ordered as a convoy to the provisions required at that post, and he marched in the forenoon on the 24th. The party kept the high road till they arrived at Caliaqua's estates, and Raquet's negro grounds, till they fell into Ross's road, at the extremity of Fairbairn's estate, where they were fired upon by the enemy, and an action commenced, but was of short duration; for, from some unaccountable cause, our troops gave way just in the moment of victory, and fled in different directions, pursued by the enemy.

Lieutenant-colonel Ritchie, Lieutenant-colonel Fairbairn, Lieutenant-colonel Leith, Capt. Heron, 60th, Lieut. Brown, 46th, Lieut. Paterson of the rangers, and Mr, Thomas Durham, a volunteer in the 60th, with some privates, amounting to about eighteen in number, but which was afterwards augmented to upwards of thirty, retreating to Collin's estate, and threw themselves into the mill, and behind the ruins of the buildings, where they defended themselves for several hours against a very large body of the enemy, who made several unsuccessful attempts to force them, in which they lost many men. About dark, finding all their efforts vain, the enemy retired. Lieutenant-colonel Ritchie was unfortunately wounded in the leg stepping out of the mill to reconnoitre, and was we believe was the only person hurt of that party... Our party remained at the mill till near midnight, when they left it, carrying with them Lieutenant-col. Ritchie, who was unable, from his wound, to walk...The cool and steady conduct of Lieutenant-colonel Ritchie, the whole of this unfortunate day, could not be too much admired...

To the great regret of this whole community, Lieutenant-colonel Ritchie, whose wound we flattered ourselves would not prove mortal, died on Monday forenoon. His death, which was very sudden, is supposed to have arisen from a splinter of the bone pricking an artery, working itself out; from which accident he bled to death before assistance could reach him. In this gentleman the service has lost a cool and brave officer, and society a worthy and agreeable member.



2d, 4d, 8th, 10th, 19th, 27th, 28th, 29th, (2d battalion)-31st, 33d, 37th, 38th, 42d, 44th, 48th, 53d, 55th, 57th, 63d, 88th, and one squadron of the 26th Dragoons.

All the forces now going out are under General Abercrombie, and go with him from Cork to the Windward Islands: and afterwards, all that can be spared will be sent to St. Domingo...





News Account of Review of Militia and Fencible Regiments by Maj. Gen. Charles Graham (Former Lt. Col., 42nd Regt.), Brighton, England, July 4, 1797

Brighton, July 4. GRAND FIELD DAY. – Yesterday morning all the troops, both in barracks and quarters, marched from this place to about four miles on the Lewes road, when they were reviewed by Major General Graham. The Horse Artillery were drawn up in the first position on the right of the line; the Lanark Fencible Cavalry were drawn up on the left of the line a general salute was then given. The line next marched by companies in slow and quick time. After the second time, the line formed upon the ground of the second position, firing twice by companies from the right, as soon as the first regiment was

formed. The Artillery all this time kept firing, to cover the forming of the line. The Fencible Cavalry then formed on each flank of infantry. When the line was formed, they fired twice by wings, then twice by battalions, the Artillery firing two rounds between each different fire of the infantry. Major General Graham now gave the word of command to fire a volley, which was most rapid under the smoke. When the line had retired, the cavalry from the wings advance briskly in front, with intent to take the enemy in flank. Each squadron gave the other the right, till the right formed upon the left, while the left formed behind the Horse Artillery. The Horse as well as the rest of the Artillery next fired three rounds as fast as they could, when the enemy was supposed to be completely routed. The whole then marched home through the village of Falmer, the Cavalry being in the rear.

News Account of Review of Fencible and Militia Regiments Commanded by Maj. Gen. Charles Graham (Former Lt. Col., 42nd Regt.) by the Duke of Clarence (Future King William IV), Brighton, England, Aug. 21, 1797

Brighton, Aug. 21. The Duke of Clarence's birth-day was announced here by ringing of bells &c. At ten o'clock, the Lanark and Dumbarton Fencibles, with the flying artillery, and the Monmouth regiment of Militia, marched to the hill near Falmer, where they were joined by the Northhampton regiment of Militia, stationed at Lewes. – The following new manœuvers were introduced, under the command of Major-General Graham. The regiments marched in line, and retreated by battalions through each other. The front battalion retreated from the right or left of companies by files, and the rear battalion opened two or three files, opposite the heads of columns, to let then through. After marching about one hundred yards, the retreating battalion formed: the front battalion then retreated the same way, never going off with unloaded arms. The battalion next changed their front by companies, firing twice as they came up. They then practised charging in line after a volley, till they did it, a hundred yards at least, rapid and exact.

Obituary of Half-pay Lt. Norman MacLeod, 69th Regt. (Former Lt., 42nd Regt.),

Gruel, Isle of Skye, Aug. 28, 1797

Died at Gruel, in the Island of Sky, on the 28th of August last, Lieut. Norman Macleod, late of the 69th regiment of foot. A sacred regard to truth, which he was never known to violate; a solid, but unaffected piety; an inflexible integrity, from which, no motives of interest could ever induce him to swerve; a generous and manly openness of heats, unacquainted with dissimulation or disguise, combined with a placid serenity of temper; those principles formed the tenor of his conduct, and were the distinguishing features of his character. His friends and relations, whom he loved with an ardour of affection, seldom to be paralleled, the poor, whom charity never failed to relieve, sincerely deplore his death, and will long continue to cherish his memory with sorrow and veneration.

...Of our Old Corps I have heard nothing lately... LtCol. Alexander Stewart the Quarter Master Gen¹ Minorca is making money fast he got that thru your Old friend [Gen.] Charles Stewart who was here some time ...

Although this town is very full of company there are very few of my acquaintances here...

Do favor me with a few lines & inform me how you go on, how M^{rs} P. & the Young lady are _ I have some thoughts of visiting Scotland in the Summer & so shall endeavor to spend a week at Irvine – at present however cannot fix on my plan of future operations_

Brigade Major William Macpherson's Account of the Arrival of Ambassador and Maj. Gen. Hay Macdowal (Former Capt., 42nd Regt.) at the Court of Kandy, Ceylon (now Sri Lanka), Mar. 12 – Apr. 9, 1800

On the 12th of March 1800, between the hours of six and seven in the morning, Major General Hay Macdowall, in the capacity of Ambassador to the Court of Candy, took leave of the governor in the government-house of Columbo. Mr. North gave him a letter to the King [of Kandy, Wikrema Raja Singha], and one to the first Adigar [Prime Minister]. The letter of his Candian Majesty was delivered with all due ceremony to the appohamies appointed to take charge of it, and placed upon one of their

heads. They then moved out of the fort, followed by the ambassador, on whose departure a salute of seventeen guns was fired from the walls of Columbo. The escort appointed to attend him consisted of one thousand one hundred and sixty-four men, Europeans and natives, exclusive of pioneers and tent lascars....

In the morning of the 9th of April the Nobles of the-court waited on the Ambassador...

Having arrived at the entrance of the hall of audience several curtains were drawn, and gave us a full view of the King on his throne in a recess at the farther end of the apartment. The drawing of the curtains was the signal for six of the nobles to prostrate themselves on the ground, and for the Ambassador [Macdowal] and the gentlemen who were with him to kneel... I forgot to say that we were all obliged to take off our hats when we entered the hall, excepting the Ambassador, who did not take his off until he had delivered the Governor's letter. After keeping the Ambassador and his suite some time longer on their knees, the King at length condescended to let the whole sit down on the carpet. This, and all other communication between the King and the Ambassador took place, by the King's addressing the second Adigar, who repeated the sacred message to the Dessauve of Uva. The Dessauve then delivered it to the Cingalese interpreter, who repeated it in Portugueze to a person who explained it in English to the Ambassador, so that a few words took a long time to come from the throne to the Ambassador, and *vice cersa...*

I had the honor of receiving your friendly Communication of the 30th. Ultimo from the hands of His Excellency Sir John Wentworth for which testimony of your kindness be pleased to accept my thankful acknowledgements.

The importance of the proposed Military communication through New Brunswick to Canada seems to be universally felt and acknowledged, and a coincidence of opinion from a Gentleman of such distinguished information and ability is to me very highly gratifying; I am very sorry to have to acquaint you, however, that the idea seems (I hope only for the present) to be abandoned, as the breach formed by the projection of a part of the American territory in the best, and perhaps the only practicable Route for that purpose, appears to be an insuperable bar...



Officers' Account of the Capture of the French "Invincibles" Standard by Maj. James Stirling, 42nd Regt., Alexandria, Egypt, Mar. 21, 1801

Narrative (by Authority) of the Movements of the Royal Highland Regiment on the 21st of March, 1801

On the morning of the 21st of March the picquets of the reserve had given their fire and retired, when Brigadier General [Hildebrand] Oakes ordered the left Wing of the 42d to advance. Major Stirling, who commanded this wing, gained the left of the redoubt, in which the 28th regiment had taken post and were engaged, when he immediately encountered the enemy in front. They were at this time endeavouring to force the redoubt, the ruins and the corps which communicated from thence to the sea. To the left of the

major's position, the road from Alexandria to Aboukir passes through a considerable hollow, which separated the 42d from the guards, a space which was unoccupied by any troops in the first line. On this road the officers of the light company descried and gave information of a column of the enemy, directing its march upon their flank, and having with them a standard and a field-piece. The major himself soon after ascertained this column to be French, and directed the officer, commanding the light company, to be ready to form front to his flank, in case any attempt should be made to turn it. The firing at this time was very smart, both in his front and to the right.

Passing by the rear, he had just reached the right of the wing he commanded, when he heard a discharge of grape, and on returning rapidly to the left, saw a French battalion in his rear, with a field-piece and six horses, and two loaded camels behind them. Conceiving himself likely to be placed between two fires, he did not hesitate to order the wing to face to the right about and charge. The order was obeyed with a spirited promptness, which insured the discomfiture of part of this corps, and obtained possession of the gun. The head of the enemy's column, followed by Major Stirling, directed its movements on the ruins, and was met by the rightwing of the 42d, under Lieutenant Colonel Alexander Stewart, who here joined in the conflict.

Thus pressed, a part of the column sought shelter in the ruins, which they entered, receiving the fire of some companies of the 58th regiment.

The 42d at this time closed in with them, and their standard was taken from the bearer by Major Stirling, who consigned it in charge to a noncommissioned officer. The survivors of the enemy immediately surrendered, and were marched prisoners to the beach, by Ensign [Thomas] Hillas of the 42d regiment. Both wings of the 42d, now quitting the ruins, formed battalion, under the orders of Lieut. Colonel A. Stewart, and proceeded to the ground which the left wing had occupied, at the commencement of the action, on the left of the 28th redoubt.

Along with the 28th, the regiment was now engaged in opposing the repeated attempts of the enemy to force the redoubt; attempts repeated also, in the same manner, by fresh bodies endeavouring to come round its left, apparently to break the line of the 42d, and force the redoubt.

The column in front kept up a heavy fire, advancing at the same time, when Sir Ralph Abercromby coming up to the 42d regiment, gave orders that the enemy should not be allowed to gain the height. Orders were at that moment given by Lieutenant Colonel A. Stewart to charge, which was instantly done, and the French infantry were driven down the declivity to a considerable distance in front and left of the position of .the reserve. They retreated through the intervals of their cavalry, who were now observed, as the smoke cleared away, close to the left of the 42d.

The exertions of this charge had disordered the line, and Lieutenant Colonel A. Stewart, judging that the enemy's cavalry were preparing to charge in turn, ordered the 42d to form quickly on the grenadiers, and prepare to receive them. This moment was selected, by the enemy, for a desperate charge. It was doubtless a moment, in which a regiment, pressing close on a retreating enemy, cannot be supposed to be correctly in line. The charge of the cavalry was made *en masse*, and in some places penetrated the intervals which had been occasioned by the movements to form on the grenadiers; an order which, in the continued firing of musquetry, could not be distinctly heard by the whole battalion. The right were protected by the fire of the 28th on the redoubt, and Brigadier General Stewart, bringing up his brigade, at this critical moment, his own regiment gave the enemy a close and well-directed fire, which allowed time to the 42d to join their efforts to those of the rest of the reserve and of the foreign brigade in repelling the cavalry. This service was speedily accomplished with the effect stated in the dispatches of the Commander in Chief. The rest of the action consisted of sharpshooting and cannonading, as stated in the same dispatches,

The non-commissioned officer, Serjeant Sinclair, to whom the standard was given in charge, was wounded in the rear of the regiment, and by him the standard was lost.

The 42d reflect with great satisfaction on the prompt and effective support they received from the 28th regiment, the flank companies of the 40th regiment, the 58th regiment, and Queen's German Regiment, with whom they more immediately acted.

The above narrative was drawn up from information furnished by the officers concerned and at their desire it has been submitted to our inspection; and we declare it conformable to our best observation and recollection of the facts.

[William] Monro Caithness Legion [Fencibles] & has two children with the prospect of more...

News Account of Smallpox Scars on Lt. Col. Alexander Stewart, 42nd Regt., Alexandria, Egypt, Mar. 1801

Salisbury Square, June 30 ...How many cases there have been of supposed inoculation of the latter which have proved unsuccessful. Among many instances which I heard of among the people even of the late expedition to Egypt, let me offer one. The name of [Alexander] Stuart, lieutenant colonel of the 42d regiment, may be recognized by many of your readers: I mean the worthy officer whose signature has been published on the late dispute respecting what has been called the "Invincible Standard." I do not remember any in the expedition more marked with the Small-pox. He told me, when going about the fleet in Marmorice harbour vaccinating the soldiers and sailors, "that he had been inoculated for the Small-pox when a boy, and had been considered as having gone through the disease very favourably; but that he had afterwards taken it in the natural way – you see what I have suffered from it.

The weight of mental stress added to an inflammation in his eyes that has almost entirely deprived him of Sight, tenders Your Memorialist totally incapable of Activity in every other [illeg.] of life, And at the moment when the happy tidings of Approaching peace have been Announced to a rejoicing Country, he Stands Alone unprotected, unprovided for, and unable to Assist himself. – Under this Prossesion of Accumulated distress, he presumes to Solicit Your Royal Highness's protection, and that that your benevolint [text missing from bottom of copy] to serve his King and Country with Zeal and

fidelity. – Your Memorialist will further intrude on Your Royal Highness's time by Stating that he has thus but Strictly followed the example of his Ancestors – His Grandfather Dugald Campbell of Craignish was long in the Army and saw very hard service in Flanders, being Appointed first to a Lieutenancy in [Capt. Simon] Lord Lovats [Highland] independent Company in April 1725, and to A Company in the Earl of Crawfords [43rd Highland Regt.] in October 1739 – His two Sons James, your Memorialists father, and Lachlan were Lieutenant and Ensign in the same Regiment, the latter killed carrying the Colours at the Battle of Fontenoy – Your Memorialist, as has been said, served in the [torn], /42^d. Regiment/ [torn phrase] only son [James], now a Lieutenant in the 72. Regiment, is just recommended for the purchase of a Company in that Corps with the remains of his patrimony – Your Memorialist has now to look forward to Your Royal Highness as the only means through which his Majestys most gracious and Royal bounty can reach him, and tho he would not Venture to urge further grounds in Support of his [illeg.], he, with due deference, maintains that half-pay as Captain, a place of Barrack-master or any Similar [torn] would render more Comfortable the remainder of a life [torn] [word blocked by seal] and cheerfully devote every day of to his King and Country [word blocked by seal]

The remainder of the gallant 42d, or Royal Highlanders, are arrived at Spithead, last from Gibraltar, in good health and high spirits. Col. James Stewart, with three companies, are on the Ceres frigate. Three companies under the command of Col. Alex. Stewart, came home about three weeks since in the Resource, and the remainder of the regiment, under the command of Colonel William Dickson, are also arrived in the Dolphin frigate, having touched at Malta and Gibraltar. The Ceres and Dolphin are put under quarantine.

News Account of Maj. James Stirling, 42nd Regt. Being Enthusiastically Celebrated for Bravery at Battle of Alexandria, Edinburgh, Jan. 13, 1802

SCOTLAND.

On Jan. 13 appeared at the Assembly Rooms, Edinburgh, Major Stirling, of the gallant 42d regiment, that conquered Bonaparte's *Invincibles*, in the full uniform of that regiment. He was received with the loudest and most enthusiastic applause, the music immediately striking up the favorite song of the Highland Character, 'In the garb of old Gaul.' On the celebrated 21st of March, when the French found their retreat entirely cut off by the Highlanders, two French officers advanced to Major Stirling, and delivered their standard into his hands. He immediately committed it to the charge of serjeant Sinclair, of the same regiment. He being soon wounded, the standard was found in the field by a private of a Minorca corps, who carried it to his own regiment. It was marked with the name of the different victories of the Hero of Italy; but considerably worn. The name of the battle of Lodi was scarce legible. All the British troops shewed equal courage on the day that decided the fate of Egypt.

LONDON FRIDAY, SEPTEMBER 23...

A Ceylon Gazette Extraordinary was published on 23d of February, announcing this important event by the following document.

Coltons of the Pearl Fishery, near Chilow, Feb. 22, 1803.

A dispatch, of which the following is a copy, was this morning received from Major-General Hay Macdowall, commanding the forces of Ceylon, by his Excellency the Governor.

One mile East of Ceriagammine, Feb. 19, 1803.

SIR, – It is with great pleasure I inform your Excellency, that the advance under Lt. Col. Logan, of the 51st regiment, attacked this morning and carried the two strong and important posts of Galle Gederah and Girigamme. At the first (in which the enemy abandoned three very curious brass cannons), no resistance was made: at the last, a heavy fire commenced, the moment the grenadiers of the 19th; under Capt. Honner, which led, appeared, and was maintained, though with little effect, until the assailants entered the battery. From their contemptible mode of defence, the enemy, I presume, have not suffered much loss; on our side, one serjeant one private, of the 19th regiment, are severely wounded. From the steepness and narrowness of the paths, had the Candians behaved with common resolution, this conquest would have cost is the lives of many brave men. The Adigaar, it is said, had fled into the Four Corles, and the troops who were lately under his command, are dispersed in the woods, or have retired towards Candy. The road to the capitol is now open: I shall reach Katoogastotte on the Mahasille Ganga to-morrow, and next day have it on my power to march into it. I have no news of Lieut. Barbut's detachment. I have the honour to be, &c.

HAY MACDOWALL

The Madras Gazette Extraordinary of the 7th of March... states that intelligence had been received at Columbo, that the detachments of the army had joined on the morning of the 21st. The King of Candy and the first Adigar had abandoned the capital, and fled to the province of Ouva, after having set fire to the palace and several temples. Gen. Macdowall had placed a guard upon the palace; and by the exertions of the British soldiers the fires had been extinguished, but not until the building was nearly consumed. On the 26th of February his Excellency Governor North published in General Orders his congratulations Major-General Macdowall, Col. Baille, Lieut. Col. [G. B.] Barbut, their Officers, and men, on their possession of the capitol of Candy, and the successful advancement of the business with which they were entrusted.

I therefore request the favour of you to acquaint me if there are one or more bidders for Strone and the Glen, as I shall be determined by a report you are pleased to make me on the part of the Duke of Gordon.

I felt most keenly the change between the cool climate and refreshing showers & breezes of Colombo [Sri Lanka], and the arid, parched and destructive land winds on Chaultry Plain [inland from Madras, now Chennai] – I never desire to see that abominable hole again, and if by accident I should ever arrive at the temporary command of the Army (the permanent is out of the question) I should immediately remove the Head quarters to a milder region... I presume your worthy Uncle the General [Thomas Stirling, Younger of Ardoch] will not allow you to plough the main any more, it may be many years before that long wished for moment is

attained. I left Ceylon [now Sri Lanka] with regret, having been for near five years there in a most respectable & lucrative situation, & I tell you candidly that it was a pitiful action in Lord Hobart to remove me. – Were I by you, I could give you a thousand better reasons for continuing me, than the only one he pretended to publish 'I had too large a salary' – Let him or his successor look at the management of the Military disbursement during my reign & Gen¹. Wemyss's and then tell me how the system of economy has answered. – After serving thirty years (and arriving at the rank of a General officer, I having scarcely been absent from my duty during all that time 12 months) I am rewarded with an appointment from which I can save £3000 a year - I will ask you or any impartial man, if that is a very extravagant recompense! - my means are now sadly reduced, as from my present income I cannot lay by £500! One source of uneasiness arises from this alteration in my circumstances, namely, that I can no longer assist my brother [William Macdowall of] Garthland. I have ever beheld my own fortune and prospects in a secondary point of view, & while he is embarrassed and distressed, I never could enjoy affluence anywhere... The Chief Command having been given to an old & meritorious officer, Sir John Craddock, my prospect of succeeding Stuart is marred... shall be very satisfied if Garthland can secure me the reversion of Ceylon, even after the next Governor, and mean time I might be ordered back to Command the troops, & Gen¹. Wemyss replace me here...

My respect go Gen¹. Stirling My love to my dear Aunt, to [illeg.] Christian and not even forgetting John Campbell



LETTER FROM MAJOR-GENERAL STIRLING.
TO THE EDITOR.

SIR,

A FEW days ago I perused the "Annals of the Peninsular Campaigns," and at page 92, vol. ii., it is stated, that, from some *misapprehension*, the 42d Regiment had retired at the battle of Corunna.

Having had the honour to command the 42d Regiment in that action, I feel it incumbent on me to state to you, that what relates to the 42d (under that paragraph) is very inaccurate: The 42d *never retired*, as therein stated, or evinced occasion for "a brief but animating address from the General."

On the advance of the French to the village, of Elvira, Sir John Moore allowed the enemy [French army] to deploy, and form their line at half musket-shot from us. He then gave me orders (about half-past two o'clock) to advance and charge with the 42d, accompanying that order with the words, "Highlanders! remember Egypt!"—which is the only address they received from him, or any one else. As soon as the regiment had given their fire, and drove the enemy with the bayonet to the bottom of the ravine, Sir John directed me to halt the corps, and defend that position; and turning myself round to him when he gave the order, I saw him at the moment struck to the ground off his horse, and I immediately sent a party to carry him from the field. The grenadiers and first company, not hearing my word of command to halt, continued the charge a little in advance, as did the light company also, when I was ordered by Lord William Bentinck, commanding the brigade, to recall them, and form them in line with the regiment; and in that position, as directed by Sir John Moore, the corps continued in close action with the enemy, until night put an end to the contest; when the picquets were posted on the ground occupied by the regiment, who then retired, as ordered, with the rest of the army to the bivouacs occupied by the troops at the commencement of the battle, and which we quitted at ten o'clock the same night for embarkation.

His reply was most characteristic: "Weel, yer honour, ye see, we were drawn up in line. Some o' us had faan [fallen], for the cannon-shot came thick; but no' a man but stood as firm and dour as Craig Alachy. The Cornel, honest man, just walked about in front o' us wi' a bit switch in his hand, as quietly as if he had been on the parade on the Castle Hill o' Embro'. Naething anger'd him till we cam' to the charge; and then he was aye foremost, and just like a wild boar."

I am very comfortable on board the Lady Jane Dundas.

I hope Captain and Mrs. Pellew and all your party are well.

My Dear Sir,

Excuse pencil. Your Letter tells me you wished to see me on board, but I am not very well and have rather laid low since I accidentally heard of the extraordinary conduct of the Madras Government. During the voyage will take an opportunity of stating the circumstances to you.

Your kind offer of accommodation I would with great gratitude accept, but I am quite snug and comfortable here. I beg to offer you my sincere acknowledgments.

Capper and Boles have been suspended the service for obeying my orders. I thought it necessary to reprimand Col. Munro and they issued my orders.

I will not add more at present, but trust that when the circumstances are made known to you, you will allow of the necessity on my part of not compromising the honor of the profession or the situation I held.

General Baillie came on board last night. Colonel and Mrs. Orr are quite well and all beg to present their best regards to you.

The four Absentees are, I consider, gone on also to St. Helena, which was the second rendezvous." The 826-ton Indiamen Lady Jane Dundas with Lt. Gen. Macdowal onboard was one of the four absentees. All four of the absent ships were lost without a trace.

LEWES, MARCH 23, 1812...

LAST Saturday being the anniversary of the battle of Alexandria, in which the 42d or Royal Highlanders, so nobly distinguished themselves, the Officers and men decorated their caps with sprigs of laurel, in commemoration of the victory, and in honour of the day. The Officers appeared in their best uniforms, and Colonel Stirling wore an elegant sabre, a present from the Non-commissioned Officers and Privates as a mark of the respect they owe him. The scabbard is highly wrought and richly gilt, and the blade beautifully ornamented with various emblematical devices, and inscriptions. The centre exhibits these words. "A Testimony of Esteem and respect from the Non-commissioned Officers and Privates of the Royal Highlanders, to Lieutenant Colonel James Stirling, their Commanding Officer," bounded on one side by the Colonel's arms, motto, *semper fidelis*; and on the other, in a sort of transverse border, by the countries in which he served, viz. America, Germany, Egypt, Spain, and Holland. In short this sabre is a very honourable and flattering testimony of the Colonel's worth.

My Lord,

The pleasure which I am aware Your Lordship feels in having an opportunity to ameliorate the condition of the unfortunate offspring of deceased officers of merit, induces me to take the liberty of expressing to Your Lordship the distressed Situation of Miss Ann MacGregor, Daughter of the late Captain Alexander MacGregor late of the 65th. Regiment of Foot, who died of fatigue under the Walls of Martinique, after the Siege of that place in the Year 1794, much and justly regretted, after having Served His Majesty for the space of Eighteen Years, with loyalty and honour. - His gallant conduct and bravery at the taking of Martinique and Guadeloupe was represented after his Death by Sir Charles Grey, who commanded the Expedition then in the West Indies, to the Commander in Chief in London, who was graciously pleased to order all the Commissions which Captain MacGregor purchased to be sold for the relief of his Widow and five helpless children, to enable them to return to Britain – But, although the Commissions were Sold the Money which they produced was also almost all exhausted before the family arrived in Scotland, in Consequence of Debts which had to be defrayed from the amount, and the great expence which necessarily attended the removal of so numerous a Family. – I further beg leave to represent to Your Lordship, that Captain MacGregor had a Son (William Oliphant MacGregor) a Lieutenant in the 65th. Regiment, and his friends being anxious to get him forward in the Service, and with a view that he might be of use to his Mother and Sisters, borrowed in the Year 1797, the Sum of £950 to purchase a Company for him in the Same Corps, on Condition that the said Sum would be repaid by him in instalments, but owing to misfortune and other particular circumstances he never had in his power to discharge this Debt, and it consequently remains a burden on the Family. - Soon after Lieutenant MacGregor was Gazetted to a Company he was ordered to the east Indies to join his Regiment where he remained for several Years, until his health was affected by a Liver Complaint and Dropsy which caused his return to Europe, and was the ultimate occasion of his Death, which happened at Chichester in England in the year 1810 (at which time he was a Major in the 77th. Regiment. –) after having faithfully Served His Majesty during a Space of Fourteen Years, having behind him a Widow, a Mother, two Brothers & two Sisters, all with very little means of Support – The Major was Miss Macgregor's principal dependence, and Since his Death she has been reduced to very great privation & distress, having no resource whatever except upon the bounty of her relatives, none of whom are well able to assist her -

Under Such distressing circumstances I am induced to indulge the hope that Your Lordship will take Miss MacGregor's deplorable case into your humane and favourable consideration, and extend to her the benefits of the Compassionate List, to such an extent as Your Lordship may consider Expedient and necessary for her future Support as a reward for the long and faithful Services of her Father and brother, both of whom died in the Army in consequence of Fatigue and Diseases contracted in the Service of this Country –

I would not have ventured to trouble Your Lordship upon this occasion if I did not consider that the merits of the case were deserving of that liberal and humane consideration which Your Lordship has so repeatedly coinced for the relief of the destitute and Fatherless. —

AN ACT for the restoration of William Nairne esquire to the dignity and title of lord Nairn. (17th June 1824.)

Whereas William lord Nairne was impeached of high treason before the house of peers and convicted thereof and adjudged guilty upon the ninth day of February one thousand seven hundred and fifteen whereby his blood and honours became attainted And whereas by an Act passed in the nineteenth year of the reign of his Majesty king George the Second intituled An Act to attaint... John Nairn taking upon himself the title or stile of lord Nairn... John Nairn commonly calling himself lord Nairn the eldest son of the said William lord Nairn was also attainted of high treason And whereas William Nairne esquire is the great grandson and lineal representative of the said William lord Nairn and the grandson and lineal representative of the said John Nairn calling himself lord Nairn And whereas the said William Nairne hath upon all occasions conducted himself dutifully and loyally towards your Majesty and your royal father May it therefore please your Majesty that it may be enacted and be it enacted by the King's most excellent Majesty by and with the advice and consent of the lords spiritual and temporal and commons in this present Parliament assembled and by the authority of the same that the said William Nairn and all other persons who would be entitled after the said William Nairn to succeed to the honors dignities and titles of lord Nairn in case the said judgment had not been pronounced and the said Act had not been made shall be and are hereby restored to the said honours dignities and titles of lord Nairn with all rights privileges and preeminences thereunto belonging as fully amply and honourably as if the said judgment had never been pronounced...

EARL OF BALCARRES

March 27. At his seat, Haigh Hall, Lancashire, aged 73, the Right. Hon. Alexander Lindsay, sixth Earl of Balcarres, co. Fife, seventh Lord Lindsay of Cummernald, one of the sixteen Representative Peers of Scotland, a General, and Colonel of the 63d regiment of foot.

He was born in 1752, the eldest son of James the fifth Earl, by Anne, daughter of Sir Robert Dalrymple of Castleton, knt. He succeeded his father in February, 1767, and being of a military family and disposition, entered the army on the fifth of July in that year as Ensign of 53d foot, which regiment be joined at Gibraltar immediately after. His Lordship obtained two years leave of absence to travel on the continent; was allowed to pass over the rank of Lieutenant, and was appointed to a company in the 42d, Jan. 28, 1771, and to a Majority in the 53d, Dec. 9, 1775. He served three years in Canada and North America, under the late Generals Sir Guy Carleton and Burgoyne; was present at the action at Trois Revieres, June 1, 1776; commanded the Light Infantry of the army at Ticonderoga and Hughbarton, July 7, 1777; also at Freeman's Farm, Sept. 19, on the heights of Saratoga and Freeman's Farm with the command of the advanced corps of the army, Brigadier General Fraser being killed, in the action of the 7th of October. The 8th of October his Lordship was appointed Lieutenant-Colonel of the 24th foot, which regiment he accompanied to the interior, of the country, it having been included in the convention of Saratoga. On the death of Lieutenant-General [Simon] Fraser, the 71st regiment, consisting of two battalions, was formed into two separate and distinct regiments, viz. the 71st and the 2d 71st, and Lord Balcarras was appointed Lieut.-colonel Commandant of the 2d 71st, Feb. 13, 1782; that regiment was disbanded in 1783, and his Lordship remained on half-pay six years and a half.

He returned to England, and soon after his return was examined before a Committee of the House of Commons relative to the events which led to the unfortunate capitulation of Saratoga. He married June 1, 1780, Elizabeth, only child of his uncle, Charles Dalrymple; of North Berwick, esq. by Elizabeth, only daughter of John Edwin, esq. by Elizabeth, eldest dau. of Sir Roger Bradshaigh, of Haigh, co. Lancaster, bart. (which estate, on the failure of the issue male of the Bradshaighs; devolved on Elizabeth, Countess of Balcarras). By this lady the Earl had four sons and two daughters, James, the eldest son, late M. P. for Wigan, has succeeded to his father's titles; Charles-Robert, the second... Edwin, the fourth son...Elizabeth Keith, his Lordship's eldest daughter... his second daughter, Anne...

Earl Balcarras received the rank of Colonel, and a special commission to command in Jersey, Nov. 20, 1782; and was charged for one year with the correspondence and communications with the armies of la Vendee and les Chouans. He was first elected one of the sixteen Peers for Scotland in 1784, and had been re-chosen for every parliament since that time except that which sat between 1796 and 1802.

His Lordship was promoted Aug. 29, 1789, to the Colonelcy of the 63d foot, which he retained till is death; and received the rank of Major-General, Oct. 12, 1793. He continued on the Staff at Jersey till removed to command the forces in Jamaica in 1794, when he was also placed at the head of the civil administration as Lieutenant Governor. He held also a general military superintendance over the St. Domingo districts nearest to Jamaica. He resided in that island during the whole of the Maroon war, which commenced in 1795; on its conclusion the assembly voted Lord Balcarras 700 guineas for the purchase of a sword. During his residence he purchased some plantation property. The rank of Lieut.-General was conferred on his Lordship Jan. 1, 1798. The period of his continuance on the staff in the West Indies was six years and nine months; and he was advanced to the rank of General Sept. 25, 1803.

Poughkeepsie Dutchess County, State of New York 20th March 1829

Sir,

Circular N°. 621 Signed D. Sulivan, dated War Office 22nd October 1828, containing a blank form to be filled up by me, came to hand the 1st of the last month. In compliance with the Order therein contained I have the honor now to inclose the said form filled up as far as it is in my power to do so, and take the liberty to avail myself of the provision granted of addressing you, stating the reasons why I am incapable correctly to answer <u>all</u> the questions in said form.

The Commission I have the honor to hold in His Majestys service, I must respectfully beg leave to state was purchased (I think I heard my father say of an Ensign [David] Sutherland, but of which I am by no means certain) in the 42nd Regiment Royal Highlanders, I was very young, consequently my recollection is very imperfect, I however do recollect something as to Order to join my Regiment, but at what time those orders were received I am totally ignorant, neither am I acquainted as to the period of being transferred from the 42nd to the Half Pay of the 84th or as to with or without the difference, but have very reason to believe the last. My youth at the time of the purchase of my Commission placed me intirely under the control of my father, and subsequently my Attention being turned to mercantile concerns, it did not occur to me to press upon him the particulars previous to his death, a reference however to the Book of the Department at War, it is presumed will answer all the Questions of which I am ignorant – I am however perfect in my recollection of seeing my name in the Army List in the 42nd Regiment, and subsequently in the 84th but cannot bring to mind the period.
